

Hulu And BBC One Put An Intriguingly Personal Spin On The Apocalyptic Thriller. By Lori Acken

It's the stuff of countless films and TV shows: What would you do and who would you become if you knew exactly when you would die and what would spell your demise? For Hard Sun's Brit detectives Elaine Renko (Agyness Deyn) and Charlie Hicks (Jim Sturgess), wary new partners keeping some doozy personal secrets, the investigation into a young hacker's murder uncovers an MI5 plot to hide humanity's looming extinction, upending the pair's private and professional worlds as they try to mitigate the revelation while managing their own affairs.

Though the guarded, principled Renko is initially brought aboard to quietly investigate a possible (and epic) wrongdoing by her morally flexible colleague, their horrific shared discovery and its fallout lends a shared clarity about the nuances of human behavior and what constitutes a punishable offense though they're not above beating the snot out of each other to reach detente. "We only have each other to talk about this one thing," Deyn muses, "so we have to come together at some

point to cope with this and move forward to distinguish the effects that this so-called leak is going to have on society."

"You really look at the different ways people are going to react," says Sturgess. "There's people who are just going to bring chaos to their last dying days on the planet, but there'll be people who are desperately trying to fight for keeping peace and order and making sure the hard time is not just wrapped up in chaos.

"We're all rushing towards our own personal apocalypse," Sturgess continues, adding that he mined transcripts of interviews with terminal patients for insight about how to soldier on when your days are numbered. "So, it's a metaphor for your own journey in life, because there is ultimately an end for everybody, whatever it may be. Make sure that you are appreciating the details and all the simple little things - that life is @#\$%ing incredible!"

ROSEANNE

The Beloved Series **And Its Outspoken Star** Return To ABC.

Following in the nostalgia-filled footsteps of other series (Will & Grace, Full House/Fuller House), ABC is proudly rebooting its groundbreaking comedy Roseanne. The exploits and adventures of the working-class Conner family center around the mother of the family, played by comedian Roseanne Barr. "I think it's fun to check back in with the family that you knew and felt you knew so much about and that you enjoyed so much," Barr said at the Television Critics Association's winter press tour. "This was a show about female empowerment, about people speaking their minds," added executive producer Tom Werner. "It was very important for us to come back and honor that."

Now, the series, led by its outspoken matriarch, returns to ABC for nine new episodes. Most of the series' original cast takes part in the revival, including John Goodman, Laurie Metcalf, Sara Gilbert, Michael Fishman and both actresses who played eldest daughter Becky, Lecy Goranson and Sarah Chalke, although Chalke will play a new character in the reboot. Estelle Parsons, Sandra Bernhard and Johnny Galecki will make guest appearances. The series will also acknowledge the death of Glenn

Quinn, the actor who played Mark in the original series, while ignoring a few plot elements like the final-season death of Goodman's character, Dan.

When it aired in the '80s and '90s, Roseanne was the unapologetic voice of the middle class, and viewers dubbed Barr their heroine. Throughout its nine seasons, the series was consistently at the top of Nielsen ratings and was lauded for its unashamed exploration of class, race, weight and sex in Middle America. "I've always tried to have it be a true reflection of the society we live in," explains Barr. In the new season, the show casts its eye upon the divisive state of American politics, aging, gender, healthcare and the nation's opioid crisis. And, as it did decades ago, Roseanne will tackle the tough issues with a dose of brutal honesty and heart. "The humor comes from reality," says Goranson. "It comes from a deep place, and I think that people want a meal and not a snack, and they've had

a lot of snacks over the past 20 years. That's my small opinion."

As for Roseanne, she's thrilled to just have the chance to close the Conner family story. "I think that I've grown up. I'm a grandmother now. I have six grandchildren. And I'm 65 years old. And I'm so happy that I have Medicaid. Or is it Medicare? I mix them up. And, in fact, this whole arc of this season is about healthcare and stuff like that," Barr says. "In the original series,

I always wanted to have a 10th year so that I could do exactly what I did in these nine [episodes], which was to finish and complete the story of this family, so I always had that in my head that that was how it would go. And so I'm very happy that we got a 10th season and we got to do that."

A Modern Take On The Late '80s Cult Classic Is Big Fun! By Ryan A. Berenz

t's been nearly 30 years since Veronica (Winona Ryder) and J.D. (Christian Slater) plotted to overthrow the cruel cadre of Heathers at the top of Westerburg High School's social strata. The dark comedy Heathers endures, mostly because it is eminently quotable and teenagers are still terrible people, but now they have Instagram.

Paramount Network's series Heathers reboots the film for the present day with a few twists on the original clique. "We've got a black Heather, a plus-sized Heather, a queer Heather," explains Brendan Scannell, who plays Heather Duke. "So there are these communities that still face discrimination but in our show are sort of turning that on its head and using the power of the internet and the power of pure self-confidence to trash everybody around them."

Series creator Jason Micallef says the movie Heathers is like his Star Wars. "This show is like a love letter to the original movie," he says. "Your viewing of it will be so much more enhanced if you watch the original movie beforehand, because there are so many little Easter eggs in each episode." How very.

You won't have to look hard or wait long for an

appearance by Shannen Doherty, who played the original Heather Duke. "She is in the very first scene of the very first episode," Micallef says. "That's all I've got for you."

AMERICAN IDOL

What You Need To Know About The Singing Competition's Return. By Kellie Freeze

Nearly two years after *American Idol* ended its 15-season run on FOX, the reality singing competition returns to TV with a fresh bounty of starry-eyed talent hoping for their chance at stardom. And if you're wondering what to expect, the reality juggernaut offers an inside look at the new *Idol*.

Seacrest In – While its home is on a new network, much of the series has remained the same, including the show's format, many of its producers, and its Emmy-winning host, Ryan Seacrest. "Ryan has been there right from the beginning," says executive producer and showrunner Trish Kinane. "It wouldn't be the same without him."

Prepare To Be Judged – To serve as judges, the series has drafted three forces in the music industry: country star Luke Bryan, pop queen Katy Perry and Motown legend Lionel Richie. All three stress a desire to discover and launch a career into the stratosphere. "We're here to really find a star," says Perry.

Idols Give Back – Perry also reveals that one reason she wanted to become an *American Idol* judge was because of her own struggles on the road to success in the music industry. She calls it "a real 'pay it forward' moment."

Richie's Riches – Richie has visited American Idol before, and explains the difference between being a judge and appearing as a guest judge and mentor. "It's more committed, I'll tell you that for a fact. Before, you stop in, you give your advice, and then you leave," he explains. "Before, I mentored, but I didn't know the contestant's backstory. The part I like about this show is they have a life story that leads them to why they are there."

Luke Loves It – "I'm in there on the emotional ride with these kids," says Bryan, who admits to being a fan of the show. "When they start singing and they are moving me emotionally, I get wrapped up in the moment. I get wrapped up in the pageantry and the dreams coming true."

When You Wish Upon A Star ... – "The Cinderella story is still alive," says executive producer Megan Michaels Wolflick, who has been with the series since its early seasons. "You think about Carrie Underwood with the pink shirt and the jeans walking into the room. That's where we start. At the bottom. You walk in in your street clothes. You're not glammed up with hair and makeup. This is who you are. And then the viewer gets to watch as you evolve into the Cinderella at the end. ... And that's the magical part of the show."

Idol Hits The Road – One of the elements that *American Idol* has kept alive is its nationwide talent search. This season, the show visits 23 cities in search of America's next superstar. Eleven of *American Idol*'s first 15 winners have hailed from the Southern U.S.

Synergy – One of the biggest additions to *American Idol* has been the support of ABC's parent company, The Walt Disney Company. "We've had BB-8 from *Star Wars* auditioning for us," says Kinane. "And we're gonna do a Disney night of Disney songs with Disney stars, as well as our contestants. And we've never been able to do it before."

Judd Apatow's Lovingly Made Documentary Is An Insightful Meditation On His Late Friend's Search For Himself Through His Comedic Art. By Jeff Pfeiffer

unning nearly four and a half hours, Judd Apatow's compelling two-part HBO documentary *The Zen Diaries of Garry Shandling* is a fascinating film that draws you in quickly, and somewhat quietly. It's befitting to its subject, Garry Shandling, who not only broke ground with his own innovative humor, but also imparted an often unsung influence onto a generation of standups and actors who have come to shape the comedy landscape over the past 40 years.

"He was like this comedy angel," Sacha Baron Cohen says in the film. Sarah Silverman offers a similar assessment: "The 'Garry Effect' is beyond what any of us can really imagine."

They are among those mentored by Shandling with whom Apatow –

who had a long, close relationship with Shandling himself – talked for *Zen Diaries*. It's a list that reads like a who's who of modern comedic greats: Jim Carrey, Jay Leno, Kevin Nealon, Conan O'Brien, Bob Saget, Jerry Seinfeld and Jeffrey Tambor are only a few of more than 40 of Shandling's friends and family members featured in sit-down interviews and/or archival clips.

But in this film, the true insight into Shandling's complexity and lifelong quest for the truth in himself comes not from those offering external assessments of the man, but from his own internal thoughts, as recorded in a series of journal entries written over the course of decades. Shandling used Buddhist practices like meditation and journaling to try to "still" his thoughts (the mantra-like phrase "Let go" turns up in them a lot). The film often gives

these personal and revealing entries a full-screen presence, showing them to viewers with no narration and in Shandling's original handwriting.

Apatow's presentation of these writings is a unique creative approach. The director admitted at a recent press conference that there is "a fair amount of reading involved in the documentary, and so we tried to make you not hate reading." That was successfully achieved with graphic artists who make Shandling's writings come alive on the screen. And it is a highly appropriate filmmaking choice — asking that a viewer "let go" at times to quietly reflect on the journal entries — given Shandling's own desire to take time and be "still" whenever possible.

Zen Diaries is a transcendent, meditative film in its own right, and is the closest we ourselves will ever get to the truth of Garry Shandling.

his place wants us dead," Francis Crozier (Jared Harris), captain of the HMS Terror, grimly assesses in AMC's new drama series The Terror. His fellow officers don't share his dour outlook, but he is absolutely right.

The Terror is based on Dan
Simmons' novel of the same name,
which itself was inspired by the true
story of the doomed 1845 Franklin
Expedition intended to discover the
Northwest Passage through the Arctic.

"The Franklin Expedition has been one of the most enduring mysteries from the maritime histories," says executive producer Soo Hugh. In 1846, the *Terror* and sister ship HMS *Erebus* became icebound. After spending two winters stranded, the crew members eventually had to abandon their ships. "What we do know over the past 170 years, through some of the follow-up

rescue missions, is we know some path for some of the men," Hugh says. "But probably the biggest surprise as we were doing this show was, in 2014, they discovered *Erebus* about 20 miles off course. And then in 2016 they discovered the *Terror*."

The Terror imagines what happened to the expeditioners as they battled the cold, starvation, each other, their own pasts – and possibly a large, bloodthirsty beast.

"It's a genre story as opposed to being a straightforward historical story," Harris says of *The Terror*'s horror/ sci-fi excursion. "There's nothing of that in the first episode, but you knew that that was there. And they really cleverly hinted at this eerie quality — an unsettling quality — that they'd ventured into a place that they didn't understand."



Magic-Based ABC Drama Is Like "Castle," But With Card Tricks. By Kellie Freeze

n ABC's new drama *Deception*, Jack Cutmore-Scott stars as superstar magician Cameron Black, whose career is ruined by scandal and who subsequently turns his talents in the arts of deception, influence and illusion into tools to help the FBI catch criminals. "The skill set that Cameron has developed is a real skill set," reveals Cutmore-Scott. "It's incredibly hard. It's very, very technical and very, very applicable to a lot of other professions, one of which I think is the problem-solving that is crime-fighting."

Although *Deception* is unique in the fast-paced way that Black and his team


of magical geniuses face each case, Cutmore-Scott isn't averse to viewers comparing it to ABC's former hit *Castle*. "It's a similar concept obviously insofar as we are introducing a character from a creative realm into a crime-fighting realm where he does not seem to fit really." But *Deception* also conjures up breakneck action courtesy of executive producers Chris Fedak (*Chuck*), Greg Berlanti (*Arrow*) and Martin Gero (*Blindspot*).

Cutmore-Scott reveals that as much as he enjoys his character's mastery of sleight-of-hand, he loves the uncomfortable but exhilarating physicality of performing magic. "Thus far the worst

has been hanging upside down escaping from chains for five or six minutes," the actor laughs. "It was exciting but not very comfortable; I don't recommend it as a recreational activity." But regardless of the pain of his performance, Cutmore-Scott works his magic by making it all look easy, effortless and beguilingly fun. "The things which look most natural and easy and totally unconscious are, in fact, the things that have taken days, months, years of practice and hard work and diligence," he says. "I believe Houdini's quote is 'a magician is just an actor pretending to be a magician.""

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ormer The Good Wife favorite Alan Cumming returns to CBS as the star of *Instinct*, a delightfully feisty police drama that is breaking new ground in television. "It's the first ever drama on American television, network drama, to have a gay character as the lead," says Cumming. "Which I think is an incredible thing and also a terrible thing at the same time."

Cumming shines as Dr. Dylan Reinhart, a former CIA operative turned bestselling author and university professor of criminal behavior who is drawn back into action after helping solve a crime for the NYPD. "He's sort of a fuddyduddy professor, a bit of a dandy. He kind of is a former spy. He drives a motorbike. He's gay," lists Cumming. "And also, as you say in America, he opens up a can of whoop-ass sometimes. And that's quite a nice thing to be able to do in your 50s," he laughs.

Dr. Reinhart is a much sunnier character than TV has ever seen on a crime procedural. "I like to

confound people's expectations," Cumming admits. The relationships Reinhart has with his husband (Daniel Ings), his former CIA chum (Naveen Andrews) and his book editor (Whoopi Goldberg) are simply refreshing. But Reinhart's charm is sublime when he's with Detective Lizzie Needham (Bojana Novakovic), his tough new partner. "I am excited to have characters at the center of a series who don't need to have sexual chemistry," admits Cumming, "where their relationship can be a different kind of brother/ sister, slightly passive-aggressive, outsmart-each-other rivalry, but then they grow to love each other."

Instinct delivers mystery and action, but with a light touch. Executive producer Michael Rauch says, "Hopefully when the show is over you feel satisfied watching a crime, but you also feel just a little bit lighter and happier from watching the characters and the humor."

On The Set Of Syfy's New Series To Uncover What Really Happened 200 Years Before Superman

Was Born. By Jacqueline Cutler

rypton rises in Belfast, a land battered by the Irish Sea. Yes, the planet Superman hails from was destroyed, but the world of his ancestors is re-created in Syfy's new series Krypton.

On a December set visit, I was the lone reporter who could not detail Zod's lineage, yet I was instantly hooked. This show's not just for fanboys. Set 200 years before the superhero's birth, *Krypton* weaves together time-honored mythology and new characters.

The sets are spectacular, illustrating a caste system of six guilds – labor, artisan, religion, science, lawmaker and military. The rankles live in shadows, huddle in hovels and lick rocks for water – life for them is Dickensian. The richest live highest up, their homes sparkling with gold-threaded white marble.

"We want to see the society before it blew up," explains showrunner Cameron Welsh. "We're peeling back a lot of layers that we have not seen before. This is right before Krypton is to explode. This is the planet that birthed the greatest superhero of all time."

This is the story of the people of Krypton.

"No one is fighting crime or slapping on a mask," says Cameron Cuffe, who plays Superman's grandfather Seg-El. "There's no freak of the week, and no one sees his parents get murdered and must seek revenge. Like all great sci fi, it's not about aliens or robots. It's about the people."

Plot details, however, are closely guarded as the studio worries about people pirating what they have spent a fortune creating. Reporters were only allowed moments to watch a scene. A military guild member, Daron-Vex (Elliot Cowan), puffs up, indignant. He demands to know why a bomb maker is on the lam. Equally furious is Jayna-Zod (Ann Ogbomo), resident military badass. As they rehearse this scene in the sixth episode, she hisses a few F-bombs, knowing they will not be aired.

"That was just spontaneous between Elliot and me," Ogbomo admits afterward, laughing. "I understand the language of saying what would come before."

Language is actually critical on set, so much so that Kryptonese is used. A neon sign in a dive bar is in Kryptonese; I suspect it probably says Schlitz.

Other noteworthy observations include an appearance of Superman's iconic cape, shown very early on. In the pilot, Seg-El's grandfather Val-El (lan McElhinney) sports the "S" insignia, refusing to renounce science. (Incidentally, the costume designer spent ages finding the precise shade of red for the cape, which is far heavier than it looks.)

In other costuming, Game of Thrones' McElhinney is quite solid with his costume's built-in muscles. Unlike the actor playing his grandson, he's content not knowing superhero history. "I just feel it is something I don't need to be concerned about," McElhinney says.

Cuffe, a Superman aficionado, knows enough for everyone. "It's just mental," he says. "This is the first part I ever played. I guess every kid pulls on underwear over trousers. I still don't believe in destiny, but something crazy is going on here."

an't stop thinking about the Casey Anthony murder trial and its deeply unsettling outcome? Or whether missing young Illinois mom Stacy Peterson, whose corrupt-cop husband Drew is imprisoned for killing her predecessor, died at Drew's hand, too? Marcia Clark knows just how you feel.

In her new series *Marcia Clark Investigates the First 48*, Clark – best known as the lead prosecutor in O.J. Simpson's murder trial – and her team revisit these and other famous murder cases and mysteries with disquieting conclusions, using the first two days of the original investigations as a foundation to re-examine the probes, players and evidence, and follow up on key details and witnesses initial investigators overlooked. "It's a mission, not just a show," says Clark. "We are here to show what truth there is about the case that no one knew before, and to prove who did it and who

didn't do it. It's about justice – an active show and an active reinvestigation to make the right thing happen ... so that we can have an impact."

Each episode clocks in at a fast-paced two hours, allowing Clark to present viewers with a jaw-dropping array of new information that is by turns infuriating and cathartic. In Stacy Peterson's case, Clark reveals the victim's startling confessions to her pastor, and heartbreaking revelations by Drew's stepbrother and a member of the crew that dragged the waterway thought to be Stacy's final resting place. "Knowledge is power," Clark asserts of the show's intent. "The ability to see the truth as its own end and see through misinformation and rumor that floats around a case is important."

Mother Earth Gets Mad Love On Nat Geo. By Lori Acken


Much of the talk about Earth these days is how we'll exit it — via NASA or SpaceX or maybe getting pulverized by the sort of cosmic event that got us here in the first place. That doesn't sit well with Oscarnominated filmmaker Darren Aronofsky.

Aronofsky, who trained as a biologist, paired up with the "mega-documentary" experts at Nutopia and an eight-pack of astronauts to craft *One Strange Rock*, a 10-episode love letter to our home planet. The team traversed the globe, composing a visual feast of a travelogue cum natural history lesson – what Aronofsky describes as "not just a film about animals, not just a film about cultures, not just a film about science, but blending them all together [to] tell a story that's *emotional*. The breakthrough came when we stumbled on the idea of working with astronauts. ... They all had

this different perspective on the planet that was magnificent, seeing our world from the outside."

Showrunner Arif Nurmohamed says the crew also focused on "the wonderful, emotionally connective nature of ordinary people around the world living their lives ... be it a salt trader or a scientist." People like French free diver Guillaume Néry, who demonstrates Earth's tenuous place in the cosmos in the very place where the asteroid that wiped out dinosaurs struck. Or Moroccan children hunting meteorites scientists clamor for. Narrated by Will Smith, the series inspires a childlike sense of wonder — a welcome way to leave behind the troubles in *your* world by immersing yourself in the magic of *our* world.

With its current legal drama How to Get Away With Murder humming along nicely via a watchable blend of new and established talent, Shondaland - Shonda Rhimes' invincible stable of writers and producers heads back to the courtroom with For the People.

In signature Shondaland fashion, the procedural series sexes up the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York - the nation's oldest and most influential federal court, loftily nicknamed "The Mother Court" - focusing on six newbie prosecutors and public defenders tasked with arguing high-profile, highstakes cases while also keeping order in their personal lives. According to writer/creator Paul William Davies (Scandal), each episode will generally tackle three cases - pithy stuff including the war on drugs, foreign vs. U.S. jurisdiction and espionage - either in the courtroom or by embroiling the characters in the legal issues in less conventional ways.

For the People stars The Newsroom's Hope Davis as Federal Public Defender Jill Carlan and Royal Pains' Ben Shenkman as Roger Gunn, chief of the Criminal Division in the U.S. Attorney's Office, whose comely young teams face off in and out of the courtroom. Vondie Curtis-Hall (ER) costars as veteran judge Nicholas Byrne with The West Wing's Anna Deavere Smith as a no-nonsense clerk of court.

In the Grey's Anatomy spinoff Station 19, a group of firefighters takes Seattle by storm via rescue calls that burn with action and drama. Shonda Rhimes serves as executive producer, helming potentially her last project for ABC since her move to Netflix. "[Station 19] worked hand-in-hand with Grey's and was similar in both tone and intensity, and humor and heart, but there's also an added element to this show that a hospital setting doesn't allow," says Stacy McKee, another executive producer. "There's a certain level of adrenaline and energy that comes with that that you don't necessarily find in the same way at Grey's."

McKee confirms there will be "a lot of potential for cross-pollination" between the two shows, starting with the spinoff's lead character: Ben Warren, the doctor turned firefighter portrayed by Jason George. "I've been playing [Ben] for the last eight years or so," George says. "Just like Ben was, I personally was caught more emotional than I expected about leaving the Grey's family."

In his character's case, that family isn't just metaphorical. Ben's wife, Dr. Miranda Bailey (Chandra Wilson), will remain a series regular on Grey's Anatomy, leading fans to question whether their relationship will survive his career change. Ironically, George believes that Bailey inspired his character's new outlook. "Ben started off as an anesthesiologist, and the joke Bailey says - you know, 'You knock the people out and clutch your bags of money and roll home in your fancy sports car' - that is one of the things at first that woke Ben up and started making him realize, 'Let me do something that actually counts, that challenges me, that makes a change."





Can College Hoops Overcome Its Credibility Crisis?

March Madness is a celebration of all that's great about college basketball. But when the national champions cut down the net at the Alamodome in April, one can't help but wonder if the win will eventually be tainted or wiped out by scandal.

"Been there," says Jalen Rose, former NBA star and member of the University of Michigan's famed Fab Five team of the early 1990s that saw its two Final Four appearances vacated in the wake of a scandal involving payments from a booster (Rose was cleared of wrongdoing).

College hoops faces a credibility issue at its highest level, and there's not much confidence in the NCAA to ensure fair play. Last year, North Carolina won the school's sixth national championship, then barely escaped sanctions for academic fraud that occurred over 18 years. Head coach Rick Pitino guided Louisville to the 2013 NCAA championship but was fired last year in the aftermath of an FBI investigation into a bribery scandal.

Rose believes that the way players are recruited and teams are built is at the heart of the matter. "I think that the

toughest thing that collegiate basketball has to deal with is that there's become two different ways to build your team," Rose says. "It's the McDonald's All-American route, which it seems like lately they've only chosen four or five schools — Duke, Kentucky, Arizona, Kansas. And then it's the mid-major or team in a large conference that has the third- and fourth-year players that can possibly make a long run in the tournament because they're an older, more mature basketball team."

The 2018 NCAA Tournament field is announced on TBS March 11, and play begins March 13-14 with the First Four from Dayton, Ohio, on truTV. All 67 tournament games will again be nationally televised across CBS, TBS, TNT and truTV, and stream online and on mobile devices via NCAA March Madness Live.
